Create an art gallery and auction evening

Display the beautiful artwork your students have created through the activities in our schools packs. Host an auction evening to raise money for Mukhtangan. Put your students in charge of organising the auction. This might include designing posters to advertise the event, arranging the lot numbers and creating paddles for parents and guardians to use in their bidding. Work with your older students to manage and collect the auction money; practicing maths skills, issuing receipts and calculating the total profit.

Host a plant sale

(Years three and four)

If your year three/ four class has completed the Ritu's Garden Science activity, why not hold a plant sale!

Grow a selection of plants with your class. It's their responsibility to care for their plants and water them. Link in to your Science lesson and Ritu's Garden activity by recording the different requirements for growing plants, e.g. temperature and required water. Once your class have grown their plants, invite parents along for a garden sale to raise money for Mukhtangan!



Put on a shadow puppet show

(Years five and six)

Using the shadow puppets your class made for their science project on light, host a puppet show evening! This can be a ticketed event organised by your class. Parents and family members are invited to an Indian themed show.



Bring and buy sale

Host a bring and buy sale at your school. Give your pupils the chance to run their very own stalls, practicing their organisational skills and maths skills. Ask them to create advertising for the event in order to generate items from parents and family members to sell on their stall.

‘Chai’ Morning

Invite parents and guardians to a ‘Chai Morning’! Serve teas such as Darjeeling or Assam. You might even provide small Indian ‘nibbles’ like samosas, onion bhajis, poppadoms, nan bread with dips, Bombay mix... anything else that you think of. Parents and guardians can make a donation and you might want to include additional fundraising activities like a raffle.



Mufti day

Hold your school’s next mufti day in aid of Mukhtangan! Charge students £1 to wear their own clothes for the day and raise money for Mukhtangan. You can incorporate additional activities into your lessons or assembly that day, such as looking at how people dress in India.

Organise a Bollywood evening

As part of their PE lessons, teach the children a Bollywood inspired dance routine. Get some inspiration by watching some classic Bollywood films. Organise a ticketed Bollywood evening where the children get to perform their routine in front of an audience.

Sponsored 'no electricity at school' day

Experience what it is like for many children in schools in India, learning without the help of interactive whiteboards, computers and even electric lighting!

Hold a sponsored ‘no electricity at school’ day and challenge your class to go a whole day with no electricity. You may want to link this in to your Science lessons in exploring what electricity is and what it is used for.

Organise a Diwali celebration evening

Invite parents to a ticketed Diwali celebration evening. Display children’s rangoli patterns. You may also like to link this in to your Religious Education lessons and perhaps organise for children to present what they have learned for their parents.

Also arrange Indian snacks and perhaps even celebrate with fireworks.
